24 Million Children and Counting...

EDDIE EAGLE IS NO STRANGER to hard work and long hours on the job. For two generations of youth in this country, Eddie Eagle has led the way in teaching firearm accident prevention. During those 20 plus years, Eddie Eagle spread his message to children in all 50 states, a message which has become the standard for firearm safety. It is with great joy that The Eddie Eagle GunSafe® Program, NRA's groundbreaking gun accident prevention course for children, has surpassed yet another milestone by reaching its 24 millionth child.


Created in 1988 by former NRA President Marion P. Hammer, in consultation with elementary school teachers, law enforcement officers, and child psychologists, the program provides pre-K through third grade children with simple, effective rules to follow should they encounter firearms in an unsupervised setting: "If you see a gun:

STOP! Don't Touch. Leave the Area. Tell an Adult."

Eddie Eagle program volunteers come from diverse backgrounds,

but they share a commitment to protecting children from gun accidents. Those involved include teachers, NRA members, law enforcement officers, and community activists who teach the program, as well as private donors and *Friends of NRA* participants who raise funds to pay for the program's educational materials.

More than 26,000 educators, law enforcement agencies, and civic organizations have taught the program since 1988. Thanks to their hard work, Eddie Eagle's safety message is now taught from coast to coast, reaching over one million children each year. Whether it is a school in Los Angeles, California, or a Head Start program in Marquette, Michigan, Eddie's lifesaving safety message is taught loud and clear, and thanks



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

FIREARM ACCIDENT PREVENTION is an extremely important safety lesson that should be taught to children at an early age. Living in a rural area where firearms are more prevalent in everyday life makes it especially important to share firearm safety.

Believing in the Eddie Eagle safety philosophy, Assistant Director Margaret Martin from St. George's Kindergarten in Nashville, Tennessee saw the value of implementing the program into her school. As safety curriculum developer, Ms. Martin decided to add gun safety about four years ago.

The Eddie Eagle program complements the school's existing safety curriculum. One example is that if someone does not follow safety rules, the children are encouraged to alert an adult. Sound familiar? This particular Eddie Eagle safety program is taught by the teachers.

"Children have requested the video several times," said Ms. Martin. "They remember the jingle by heart: **STOP! Don't Touch. Leave the Area. Tell an Adult.**"

Both the children and their parents have only positive things to say about the program. The Eddie Eagle GunSafe® Program teaches children




that guns are not toys. And for parents who hunt, they become more cautious with firearms in the home and start teaching gun safety to their children.

Ms. Martin shared a story with us about a young student who spent the night at her grandparent's house. She found a gun in her bedroom, followed her training, and told her mom.

to letters and calls from program instructors and parents we know that message is working!

Law enforcement's partnership with Eddie Eagle has proven to be very effective. Law enforcement continues to be the driving force that teaches the Eddie Eagle GunSafe® Program in local schools and at community safety events. Law enforcement agencies are the only groups that are authorized to purchase Eddie Eagle mascot costumes.

The NRA also offers free Eddie Eagle materials to any law enforcement

agency, educational facility, hospital, daycare, or library across the nation. Funds raised through *Friends of NRA* and distributed through The NRA Foundation (www.nrafoundation.org) enable budget-strapped schools and police departments to teach the program at minimal or no cost. The NRA encourages citizens nationwide to heighten gun accident prevention awareness in their local communities. In 2010, due to the efforts of the *Friends of NRA*, twenty-two law enforcement agencies received new Eddie Eagle mascot costumes. These mascot

costumes are a great enhancement to those Eddie Eagle Programs and ensure that children absorb Eddie's message.

Having now reached over 24 million children, Eddie Eagle has no intentions of slowing down. In fact, he plans to pick up his pace and reach every child in America with his important safety message. It is an enormous task and lots of assistance is required, but the Eddie Eagle GunSafe Program will push forward.

Volunteer Spotlight: R.J. O'Hara

SINCE 1996, BAY CITY, MICHIGAN has been lucky enough to have a dedicated safety advocate by the name of R.J. O'Hara. About once a month, the Eddie Eagle program receives a much anticipated phone call from this self-proclaimed, "Bay City Grouch." However, one glance at this retired Marine's volunteer record proves that he is anything but.

R.J. has been extremely active in promoting and teaching the Eddie Eagle GunSafe® Program to as many children as possible. Through his efforts, more than 10,000 kids have benefited from the safety lesson of Eddie Eagle. He can be seen passing out materials at local Wal-Mart stores, teaching the program at Day Care centers and working with the local park rangers at Towas Point and Bay City State Parks.

R.J. became involved with the Eddie Eagle program in 1988 while living in New Mexico. A brand new safety program at the time, R.J. saw the potential and importance of such a program and began teaching it at local Elementary Schools. Soon enough, he was receiving requests to visit from additional schools. Along with fellow volunteer Paul Rockhold (you may remember Paul from the last issue of the Eagle Eye Newsletter), R.J. spent time

teaching and promoting the program in various ways, and yes, he even wore the mascot costume!


After moving to Michigan, R.J. brought his enthusiasm to the Bay City area and started promoting the program while talking others into doing the same. He has worked closely with the Bay City State Park, and Mrs. Valerie Blaschka, who now offers the program during many of the park's community events. R.J. believes that of all the materials offered through the program, the Student Reward Stickers are the most valuable when it comes to spreading the message.

"It's easy to hand a sticker to a youngster...they stick them places and spread the message to others," said R.J. And he should know, he has passed out over 60,000 of them!

We continue to receive letters and pictures from R.J. several times a year. Each showcasing the various events that Eddie Eagle has attended and the children he has served. He shows that it is possible for one

person to make a big difference. But tell that to "the Grouch" and you will get an earful as to why he shouldn't be receiving any credit. He is adamant about highlighting the efforts of other individuals who have put in so much hard work along with him, and we are proud to thank them all.

THE EDDIE EAGLE GUNSAFE® Program relies on lots of great people in order to reach thousands of children each year with its important safety message. These folks range from police officers, teachers and guidance councilors, to social workers, civic groups, and average citizens who choose to be Eddie Eagle volunteers. These groups and individuals do everything from teaching and promoting Eddie Eagle programs in local schools or daycare centers to raising money to support Eddie Eagle materials for their area.

One group who has recently made a tremendous impact in their state is the Association of New Jersey Rifle and

Pistol Clubs (ANJRPC). The ANJRPC recently donated \$2,650 to pay for a brand new Eddie Eagle mascot costume for the Morris County Sheriff's Office in New Jersey. The Morris County Sheriff's Office has been using the program for a very long time and received their first Eddie Eagle mascot costume back in 2001. After many years and visits with Morris County youth, their costume was simply getting worn out. When the ANJRPC found this out they quickly volunteered to try and help the sheriff's office obtain a new Eddie Eagle costume. Within a month ANJRPC


